HIGHWAY ROBBERY!!!

Mr. William Griffey, of Morgantown, Va. a man of respectability and probity, was on Monday evening, 29th Oct. about a half hour after dark, attacked by two ruffians on the Morgantown road, 700 yards from Beallville, in the county, robbed of twenty five dollars, and treated with the most barbarous cruelty. The circumstances, as communicated to us by Major John M. Davis, are as follows:

After taking hold of his bridle, seizing him by the arms, and demanding his money - of which he told them he had but little, and having got it honestly, did not like to part with it in that way, - they pulled him off his horse; a scuffle ensued, during which he slipped his hand into his coat pocket, and dropped from it his pocket book, containing 750 dollars; they then searched his pockets, took his pen knife from one, and a five dollar note from another; while one of them was opening the pen-knife, he knocked the other down; when the one who had the knife made two stabs at him, one of which pierced through a memorandum book of 30 pages, the other cut through his vest and penetrated to one of his ribs, against which the blade broke; by this time the one who had been knocked down arose, and cried, "damn him, kill him," but on the suggestion of the other, they both seized Mr. G. bound his hands behind him with a handkerchief, tied another handkerchief round his neck so tight as nearly to strangle him; led him to a small tree, a short distance from the road; bound him with his back to it with his surcingle, and tied the handkerchief round his neck to the tree so high as to oblige him to stand on his toes to avoid strangulation. He then told them if money was their object, they should have all he had, if they would liberate him; they promised they would, and he told them there was a five dollar note in the pocket of his vest, (this he knew they had already found) and twenty dollars in his saddlebags, on top of his clothes. They took the twenty dollars from the saddle bags, left him bound and made off. In this painful and perilous situation he remained about an hour and a half, and was so far exhausted as to be unable to speak, when Mr. Francis Gormly near Beallville, came along, discovered, and released him. He found his horse, his pocket book with its contents, and his saddlebags, in the bottom of which he had also 80 dollars.

In Twinsburgh, Portage county, Ohio, on the 21st of September, MOSES & AARON WILCOX, aged about 50.

They, as we are informed, were twin Brothers, born in Connecticut; they were married on the same day, their wives being sisters; they hoped to have experienced religion on the same day, and attached themselves to the same church, on the same day; they engaged in mercantile business together, at Middletown, and failed together; from thence they removed and settled themselves together, in this state, at a place which from them derived the name of Twinsburgh; they were taken sick on the same day, and were buried in the same grave, and have left to their bereaved children the same rich inheritance of an unsullied moral & christian character.

The singular identity which pervaded the character of these men, and the events of their lives, manifested itself no less in their persons. During their youth and middle age, so nearly did they resemble each other as to challenge the most discriminating eye to distinguish them. Employed in the early part of their lives, in the neighborhood of each other, as school-teachers, they were wont occasionally to change schools, and always without detection, on the part of the scholars, of the change.

This venerable servant of the Lord was born in Ireland, March 12th, 1758, and was early awakened to a sight of his lost condition; and near sixty year ago, while praying in his father's garden, God removed the burden from his soul. He immediately joined the Methodist Church and was soon leader of a class which office he held until he left for America. He bro't with him a letter of his membership stating that he was an acceptable member of the church and a man of unblemished character. He landed in America, August 12th 1791 and moved to Greene co. Pa., in the fall of 1796 and was licensed to preach the Gospel Sept. 22d 1798. His house has been a preaching place and a home for the preachers for near thirty years; he preached his last sermon at Hopewell in July last. For something over one year past he had been feeble and gradually declining, until two weeks before his death, when he was confined to his bed; and feeling that he must soon die, he desired to receive the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, which was administered by brother Turner; God made it a season of great grace to the family. For some months past he lived in the fullness of the blessing of the gospel of peace without a cloud. I visited him on Christmas day and found him happy in his Saviour. I asked him if he suffered any pain, his reply was, no not one bit, either in body or mind; he then said bags of gold and silver could do me no good now; but the grace of God supports me; he then joyfully said, death where is thy sting, grave where is thy victory; thanks be to God who giveth us our victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. In this happy frame of mind he continued until New Year's day at eleven o'clock A. M. when as calm as an infants sleep his spirit left the clay tenement to join the blood-washed throng. Let me die the death of the righteous, and let my last end be like his. On the following day his funeral sermon was preached to a large and deeply affected congregation. He has left behind an aged companion who for the last fifty-four years has been a mutual sharer of the common joys and sorrow which befell them; may the Lord bless her. Also a large family of children and grand-children. May they follow him as he followed Christ.
